


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A WORD FROM SENIORS SERVICES SOCIETY OF BC

YEAR IN REVIEW HIGHLIGHTS OF 2022

- SSSBC partnered with Service Canada for efficient access to financial support for older adults, streamlining service delivery for our Housing Team.
- We launched our first podcast series, "Fridays with Seniors," hosted by Dr. Peter Legge.
- We presented the highlights of the Integrated Service Program and the SHINE program at the BCNPHA Rent Conferences in Nanaimo and New Westminster.
- We joined Peter Julian and Anne Kang in a press conference to raise donations for seniors who need fans for the summer.
- In partnership with the City of New Westminster, BC
 Housing, Salvation Army, Freybe's, Coast Capital, and
 Sanmar, we hosted an informative Emergency Preparation
 Event for residents at Ross Tower, providing critical
 information and summer resources.
- SSSBC presented Elder Abuse topics and shared resources with Seniors First and BCCRN at the Native Education Center for 60 indigenous older adults facing housing challenges.
- SHINE was featured in The Vancouver Sun, The Province, Globe and Mail, and the National Post as a unique model for seniors housing navigation on a provincial and national scale.
- Our Seniors Housing Collaborative concluded in August, successfully establishing a clear vision based on insights from key housing stakeholders. Our focus will shift to policy matters in 2023, with the potential for significant change.
- SSSBC strengthened our partnership with Seniors First by providing legal support to SHINE partners.
- Continued advocacy efforts were made with various government officials and Fraser Health to find system solutions for low-income and homeless seniors, as well as seniors facing homelessness after hospital discharge.

- Coast Capital Savings funded rapid access seniors shelter in four regions, allowing SSSBC to rent a local, furnished seniors-friendly apartment with meals.
- SSSBC participated in the Canadian Alliance to End Homelessness Annual Conference.
- SSSBC was invited as the keynote speaker at Housing Central, where Seniors Advocate Isobel Mackenzie interviewed three seniors with lived expertise.
- We hosted a holiday event at Ross Towers with Acting Mayor Ruby Campbell, MP Peter Julian, MLA's team, and various organizations in attendance, providing hot turkey meals and ornament-making activities.

- A successful Housing Navigation Training session took place with 50 participants, including private sector landlords from across the province. The training was made free and virtual through funding from the Province of BC, Vancouver Coastal Health, and the City of Vancouver.
- The Santa for Seniors online fundraising campaign enjoyed its third successful year.
- We hosted the first Connect and Prepare session to support older adults with emergency preparedness and connection in three multiunit buildings in New Westminster, funded by the City of New Westminster, Resilient Community, and United Way.
- The Ministry of Mental Health continued to generously fund SHINE, allowing us to hire an additional navigator to support our team and community partners.
- With additional funding from BC Housing, we upgraded our housing client database, technology, and transportation to expand and enhance our service delivery.

SHINE BC UPDATE

SSSBC and its partners are committed to working together under the SHINE service model to build on existing strengths and emerging best practices to deliver integrated support to vulnerable seniors in all regions of the province.

In the past year, this work has continued with muchappreciated help from the Ministry of Mental Health and Addictions, and we would also like to thank all of our partners, supporters, community, private and corporate sponsors for their continued commitment to improving the lives of older adults in our province.

Organizations like those involved in the SHINE program are critical to closing gaps in access to mental health, addiction, and housing support to address important factors contributing to seniors' overall wellness and address key determinants of health.

Canadian Census data (2019) shows that 24.6% of seniors aged 65 and above now live alone with little or no family or friend contacts. The most common gaps identified are isolation, access to mental health services, and connection to housing support.

Research has shown that when seniors can age in place or in a residence of their choosing, they tend to face fewer signs of mental health and addiction issues and experience higher standards of life. Experiences such as retirement, loss of loved ones, isolation, physical or mental health issues, ageism, and inadequate income can contribute to seniors facing discrimination and marginalization.

SSSBC designed the SHINE program to integrate links to system navigation and community supports, targeting crucial social determinants of health.

This year, we focused on expanding housing navigation services by forging new partnerships and enhancing regional collaboration. SHINE also offered the Housing Navigator Training free of charge to our partners, other older adult-serving agencies, and groups and will continue in 2024.

As of this spring, SHINE partners welcomed OneSky Community Resources in Penticton, Beacon Community Services in Victoria, and Richmond Cares, Richmond Gives in Richmond:

We have also successfully increased our resource partners to include Seniors First BC and Moving Forward Family Services, to provide provincial legal workshops and virtual counselling support, respectively, while maintaining our relationship with Westminster House Society (offering virtual addiction treatment for women) and the BC Association of Community Response Networks, along with many other community, municipal and corporate and private affiliations.

AGEISM CONSULTATION

In the fall of 2022, the Seniors Services Society of BC hosted its 1st Annual Consultation on Ageism at the Century House Seniors Centre in New Westminster, BC. With 26 attendees, the event sponsored by the BC Association of Community Response Networks (BCCRN), aimed to gather insights and perceptions on the impacts of ageism, share individual experiences, and generate ideas for solutions.

Ageism, as defined by the World Health Organization, encompasses stereotypes, prejudice, and discrimination based on age—how we think, feel, and act toward others or ourselves.

"Ageism refers to the stereotypes (how we think), prejudice (how we feel) and discrimination (how we act) towards others or oneself based on age."

Engaging in lively discussions, participants explored various topics including employment, healthcare, social inclusion, and safety. They pondered thought-provoking questions such as:

- What are the most significant ageism issues related to each theme?
- What impacts has the COVID-19 pandemic had on ageism in each of the themes?
- Which ongoing efforts effectively address ageism in these areas?
- What more can be done and who should be involved to combat ageism?

The attendees represented a diverse range of organizations, including advocacy groups, senior centers, community services, and volunteers providing peer support, information, and referrals to older adults.

The participants appreciated the inclusive nature of the ageism dialogue, noting the enriching discussions stemming from the blend of younger individuals working in the sector and older adults working or volunteering with their peers.

There was a consensus that ageism is an important topic that deserves ongoing attention, and the consultation served as a catalyst for further conversations.

PODCAST FRIDAYS WITH SENIORS

SSSBC proudly debued "Fridays with Seniors," an engaging podcast series hosted by Dr. Peter Legge from Canada Wide Media.

This series consisted of ten thought-provoking episodes, where Dr. Legge interviewed various partners and organizations dedicated to addressing seniors' issues in BC. Just over 12K listeners tuned in to carefully selected guest speakers who shared their valuable expertise, perspectives, and strategies on topics that included: housing navigation, accessing support services, mental wellness, elder abuse, emergency assistance, finances, intergenerational volunteerism, taxes, and digital literacy.

The BC Association of Community Response Networks is proud to support SSBC build a coordinated community response to the abuse, neglect and self-neglect of vulnerable adults. The opportunity to participate on Fridays With Seniors podcast is a very important way to provide outreach and awareness to the greater community."


The series highlighted SSSBC's commitment to addressing complex issues, aiming to raise awareness and advocate for seniors in BC.

The topics of Elder Abuse and Intergenerational Volunteerism garnered the most views and downloads.

We thank the Province of BC, Coast Capital, and the BC Community Response Network (New Westminster) for generously sponsoring the following podcasts: Housing Navigation, Mental Wellness, SHINE, Financial Literacy, Elder Abuse, and Digital Literacy.







The support of Coast Capital Savings, combined with the system navigation assistance provided by SSSBC, empowered seniors to navigate their housing challenges with more stability and confidence.

PARTNERSHIP SPOTLIGHT: RAPID ACCESS SHELTER PROGRAM

In honor of National Seniors Day on October 1st, Coast Capital Savings made a generous contribution to SSSBC to support senior-specific shelter spaces for older adults 60+ who experience homelessness in their later years. The funds supported four shelter spaces across different communities in British Columbia, including Fraser Valley, Kelowna, Nanaimo, and Metro Vancouver.

The Seniors Rapid Access Shelter Program, in collaboration with SHINE (Seniors Housing Information and Navigation Ease) partners, aimed to offer rapid and barrier-free access to shelter spaces that catered specifically to the needs of homeless seniors. These shelter spaces were available for up to one month, providing a temporary safe haven while seniors sought permanent housing solutions.

With the funding, SSSBC secured a space at the neighboring **Lookout Housing + Health Society.** Lookout generously provided a renovated and furnished suite. Thanks to the generosity of **Amazon** and other private funding partners, SSSBC provided small appliances, pillows, bedding, and towels for the unit.

The impact of Coast Capital Savings' support was significant, addressing a critical need in the community. The SHINE partners involved in the program expressed their appreciation for Coast Capital Savings' contribution. They emphasized the importance of rapid access shelter beds tailored to seniors' unique needs. This funding filled a crucial gap in their communities, complementing existing housing navigation services and enabling seniors to transition from homelessness to secure housing.

"Pension incomes and financial supports for seniors are simply not keeping pace with the rising costs of housing, food and personal care. As a result, people are falling further behind, and we are seeing more aging adults in Kelowna who are precariously housed and facing late-life homelessness. This is especially true for seniors who are alone or recently evicted from their rental property because of a sale. Coast Capital's support of a seniors' emergency housing unit will help our SHINE Housing Navigator provide a senior with shelter and make plans to access secure housing and get connected to community resources.

TREASURER'S REPORT



We have emerged from the COVID situation stronger financially and with a renewed vision to support the community we serve. Looking back over the period from 2019 to 2023, our revenues have more than doubled, growing from \$1.1 million million. This significant increase \$2.3 demonstrates our prudent resource management during these challenging times and our ability to meet the community's needs. We successfully shifted from running deficits to recording surpluses which has greatly improved our capacity to serve seniors.


In the latest fiscal year, our revenues grew by 31%, reaching \$2,287,311 from \$1,747,993. This growth spanned across all revenue categories, from Donations to Government Funding, enabling us to provide diverse support for seniors' needs. With increased activity and inflation, our expenses also rose to \$1,976,168 from the previous year's \$1,369,680, representing a 44% increase.


Despite the increased expenses, we still achieved a healthy surplus of \$311,144, with the majority earmarked for client-focused innovation. While this surplus is slightly lower than last year's high of \$378,162, our financial position remains robust, allowing us to face future challenges and continue delivering value to the community we serve. As part of our commitment to improvement, we will invest the surplus from fiscal 2022/23 in a modern Customer Relationship Management (CRM) system, which will help us better understand and serve our community.
